Don't Forget to Squeeze in the Annual Curran Apple Orchard Squeeze

Be sure to make plans to participate in one of U.P.'s most popular family events when the 24th Annual Cider Squeeze returns to the Curran Apple Orchard (3920 Grandview Drive W.) on Sunday, Aug. 26 from noon to 4 p.m.

The public is invited to pick apples from unmarked trees and bring them to the pressing area to watch them be squeezed into golden cider. Containers can be brought from home or purchased for \$1. Families/individuals are limited to two crates (approximately one gallon of juice) at a time. Pre-picked bags of apples will also be available for sale to take home or have pressed. No homegrown or store bought apples allowed.



In addition to all the action in the apple pressing area, there will be lots of other family-friendly activities, including:

- Music by the Sunset Bible Bluegrass Band
- Carnival games, face painting and spin art provided by Entertainment Masters
- Fabulous food from Boss Mama's Kitchen including gourmet burgers, hotdogs, garlic fries and more
- Festival treats including popcorn, cotton candy, shaved ice and...apple pie
- Artist/Sculptor John Jewell will be on hand to discuss his life-size bronze sculpture of a young girl offering an apple to a very special horse named Brewster. The artwork honors the legacy of the Curran Orchard and, as part of the project, UP for Arts will also be collecting memories about the Curran horses for possible inclusion in a future book. Children can also visit the UP for Arts booth and create their own version of Brewster.

Get Smart – School Safety Reminders

On Sept. 4, students in University Place will return to school. Some will walk, while others will ride the bus, but regardless of how they get to and from school, they are counting on adults to keep them safe.

Please remember these important safety rules:

- Slow down. Give yourself a few extra minutes of travel time to ensure you obey school zone speed limits.
- Be Alert. Children may dart out between parked cars or not use crosswalks. Drivers need to be aware of these dangers. Do not be distracted by talking or texting on the phone or by applying makeup, shaving, etc.
- Obey school bus laws. **Yellow flashing lights** indicate the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop their vehicle. **Red flashing lights** and an extended stop arm indicates the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off. Motorists must stop their cars and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again. **You must stop if:**
 - You are on a two lane roadway (one lane in each direction)
 - The roadway has multiple lanes (three or more), and you are traveling in the same direction as the bus.

Don't let one moment of carelessness change the life of a child—as well as your own. Slow down and pay attention.
