

Don't Forget to Vote on Nov. 2

Did you know there are several University Place City Council positions on this year's Nov. 2 ballot?

Although candidates Javier Figueroa (Position #1), Steve Worthington (Position #3) and Denise McCluskey (Position #5) are running unopposed, two candidates are vying for Position #4, which is currently held by



Howard Lee, who was appointed by the Council to fill the vacancy left by the passing of Ken Grassi on Sept. 26.

Chief's Corner Arrest Made in Islamic Center of Tacoma Fire

I am pleased to report that a suspect wanted in connection with the arson at the Islamic Center of Tacoma (2010 Bridgeport Way W.) on Oct. 11 was arrested yesterday without incident by a team of



investigators from the Pierce County Sheriff's Department Criminal Investigations Bureau, Special Investigations Unit and UPPD.

Thanks to diligent work by our staff and the PCSD's arson investigator, as well as tips called in to the Pierce County Sheriff Department's **Crime Stoppers Facebook page**, the 38-year-old U.P. resident was booked into the Pierce County Jail for investigation of first-degree arson.

Thankfully, no one was injured in the fire but the building suffered extensive smoke and water damage. As a result, services at the mosque have

been paused and members are seeking other locations for worship until repairs are made. A **LaunchGood campaign** has currently raised more than \$330,000 to help the Islamic Center of Tacoma raise funds to rebuild their mosque.

Although we believe this is an isolated incident, rest assured that the U.P. Police Department, in conjunction with our other law enforcement partners, will continue to ensure that all citizens have the right to worship freely and without fear of hate or intolerance.

I am confident that this crime, however despicable and illegal, will provide yet another opportunity for the community of University Place to demonstrate that we support and welcome all of those who choose to live, work, play and worship in U.P.

Chambers Creek Trail Project

The Chambers Creek Trail project saw the craning in and placement of its first pedestrian bridge across the creek yesterday, Oct. 26, downstream from Kobayashi Park. When finalized the bridge will provide a safe crossing point for trail users between U.P. and Lakewood, and prevent wading through the creek, which can cause environmental damage.


Advisory Commission Vacancies

Sometimes, it even leaks from the garbage truck. When this happens, pollution from the dumpster juice gets washed into the nearest storm drain and then flows into nearby bodies of water.

Curbside Oversized Brush Pickup

November 1-12

Pile Limitations: 1 per household no larger than 6' wide by 6' long by 6' high

The Oversized Brush Pickup is available to all residential customers of University Place Refuse and Recycling, even those without yard waste service. The pickup



day for your area will be the same as your curbside recycling or yard waste

pickup day during the weeks shown above. Remember, this is a one day event for each neighborhood. The Oversized Brush Pickup is only for the larger brush and limbs that do not easily fit into a regular yard waste cart. Limbs are removed by machine or pitchfork. Sweeping of small items by the customer can be expected.

Yes, Oversized Brush Includes: branches, brush, and limbs no larger than 6' in length or 4" in diameter. Please stack loose for pickup (no cans, bags, or bundles).

No, Oversized Brush Does Not Include: blackberry, holly, or other thorny vegetation; stumps, limbs larger than 6' or thicker than 4"; small loose items such as grass, leaves, weeds, bark, pine/fir needles, etc. No noxious weeds like scotchbroom or English ivy, etc.

If you are signed up for yard waste service, please make maximum use of your cart before placing brush in a pile. Place your oversized brush in a loose pile at the curb or within 5 feet of the driveable portion of the roadway for pickup. Make sure the pile isn't in the street or blocking access to mailboxes or fire hydrants.

Tips for a Happy and SAFE Halloween

If your children will be trick or treating this year, the U.P. Police Department reminds you to make sure they:

- Visit houses on one side of the street and then down the other side. Do not zig-zag across the street. When it is time to cross, make sure to stop and look before venturing into the street.
- Keep a safe distance of six feet between your group and others.
- Wear costumes with items like masks, capes and princess gowns that don't interfere with the ability to see and walk safely.
- Add reflective material to costumes so motorists can better see children on dark streets. Carry a flashlight to better navigate sidewalks and porches.
- Trick or treat in their own neighborhood and only approach houses with porch lights on.
- Make it home by 9 p.m. (or earlier!)
- Understand that property destruction is not a "trick"—and could result in criminal fines or punishment. If you witness suspicious or criminal activity, call 911 immediately.
- Wait until they get home to sample their goodies so they can sanitize their hands and allow you to inspect treats for safety.

And **adults, please slow down** on Halloween night! Watch for overly enthusiastic—and distracted—children. Use your headlights—even before dusk—and be patient. Give yourself a few extra minutes of travel time that evening.

What do I need to know about each kind of vaccine?

Vaccines provide excellent protection against severe illness or death from COVID-19. That means a vaccine is your best chance of returning to normal life.

Each is a little different, but your best choice is the vaccine that's available to you now.

- Pfizer:
 - Authorized for people 12 years or older.
 - Requires 2 doses at least 21 days apart.
- Moderna:
 - Authorized for people 18 years or older.
 - Requires 2 doses at least 28 days apart.
- Johnson & Johnson:
 - Authorized for people 18 years or older.
 - Requires 1 dose.


