City of University Place Honors Former Mayor Lorna Smith

Flags in front of the University Place Municipal Building flew at half-staff earlier this week to honor former U.P. Mayor Lorna Smith who passed away on March 13.

Smith spent more than 15 years in service to the City of U.P, both as an advocate for its incorporation and later as a City Council Member, Mayor Pro Tem and Mayor from 2000 to 2002. She was a tireless public servant, who in addition to her work with University Place also represented the City on several regional organizations, including the Pierce County Regional Council, Pierce County Cities and Towns, the State Route 16 Corridor Study and the Association of Washington Cities, to name just a few.



"Lorna had a vision—a vision for what she believed University Place could be if it were in charge of its own destiny—but she also possessed the willpower and work ethic to make it happen," said Caroline Belleci, mayor of University Place. "She inspired me to volunteer and to get involved in city government. I am personally forever grateful to Lorna for that, and I know she inspired many others as well."

According to her granddaughter Elena Anderson, Smith was a native of Eugene, Ore., and never finished high school. Yet she went on to become a successful businesswoman and community activist in addition to her roles as a wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. "She would always tell us that you have to have goals," recalled Anderson. "And you have to be involved in the community and help others."

Lorna Smith is survived by her husband of 43 years, Elmer Smith, three

daughters, four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Graveside services will be held at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, March 23 at **New Tacoma Cemetery**, 9212 Chambers Creek Road W., University Place.

LakiKid is a U.P.-based ecommerce company that provides an online support network for parents of children with special learning needs such as autism, ADHD and Sensory Processing Disorder. It offers monthly video educational blogs and a Sensory Adventure Club which provides children with fun games and activities that meet their physical fitness needs. LakiKid also has an online store with products such as toys to help with fine motor skills, and weighted blankets and stuffed animals designed to reduce anxiety.

Keep Coyotes at Bay

The good news is that spring has sprung. The bad news is that means the City is getting more reports of coyote sightings in University Place neighborhoods. Although coyotes are common in urban areas, especially as their natural habitats are encroached upon by development, their presence can be unsettling.

Here are some key points to avoid attracting coyotes to your neighborhood and

what to do if you spy one:

- Don't create a coyote all-you-can-eat buffet. Never feed them intentionally and avoid inadvertent feeding by securing all trash and compost in tightly closed containers. Pick up fallen fruit under trees and shrubs.
- Bird feeders can be a neon sign for coyotes. Although coyotes' primary diet consists of rodents, rabbits and birds, consider that mice are attracted to waste seed cast to the ground by birds. If coyotes know mice are feeding, they are likely to join in the feast as well.
- Keep small dogs and cats inside during non-daylight hours. Not only may
 they be prey to a hungry coyote, but they may carry diseases or parasites
 that, although rarely a risk to humans, could be a risk to domestic dogs.
 Make sure dogs are vaccinated for canine distemper to prevent them from
 contracting the disease from coyotes.
- Keep small dogs and cats inside during non-daylight hours. Not only may they be prey, to a hungry coyote, but they may carry diseases or parasites that although rarely a risk to humans, could be a risk to domestic dogs. Make sure dogs are vaccinated for canine distemper to prevent them from contracting the disease from coyotes.



- Although coyotes tend to avoid humans, if you or your children encounter one, don't run. Put your arms above your head to look as large as possible, throw objects in its direction or clap your hands, and shout in an authoritative voice. Coyotes are naturally timid so you want to leave them with a negative association of humans.
- If you spot a coyote or suspect you've lost a pet to a coyote, notify your neighbors. Once a coyote finds easy prey it will continually hunt in the area.

Residents who encounter dangerous wildlife are urged to contact Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) at 877.933.9847 or call 911. Keep in mind that live trapping is not successful with coyotes. For a list of licensed wildlife control operators or trappers, visit the **WDFW website**.

City of U.P. Developing Housing Action Plan

The City of University Place is developing a Housing Action Plan (HAP) that will encourage future construction of additional affordable and market-rate housing throughout the city. The HAP will offer recommendations and possible actions that the City can consider as it plans for the next 20 years of growth. The HAP process itself will not result in any Comprehensive Plan policy



or development regulation changes at this time.

This effort fulfills the requirements of a 2019 Washington State Department of Commerce \$5 million grant to support activities that increase residential building capacity and streamline development by:

- Quantifying existing and projected housing needs for all income levels, including extremely low-income and cost-burdened households.
- Developing strategies to increase the supply and type of housing.
- Analyzing population and employment trends.
- Strategizing ways to minimize displacement of low-income residents due to redevelopment.
- Reviewing and evaluating current success in attaining planned housing types and units, achievement of goals and policies, and implementation of the schedule of programs and actions.
- Inviting participation and input from community members, community groups, local builders and realtors, nonprofit housing advocates and area religious groups.

The City plans to have the HAP ready for adoption no later than May 31, 2021.
