Voice Your Opinion on the Future of Homestead Park

You have until this Friday, April 30 to participate in an important survey about the future of Homestead Park. The Parks Advisory Commission is seeking public input on plans to update the park and expand its potential uses.

Located at 3761 Bridgeport Way W., Homestead Park encompasses 5.5 acres and



includes wooded areas, walking trails, a fern grotto and a rhododendron collection. It is one of the City's most popular and well-used parks.

Given its location near the heart of the Village at Chambers Bay (formally known as Town Center) the park will remain protected and nurtured as an important element of the area's overall plan. But the Parks Advisory Commission also wants to know what the public thinks about adding facilities such as picnic shelters and restrooms, as well as hosting events in the park, including art shows, concerts, etc.

The public is also invited to provide additional input at a virtual public meeting on April 28. The Parks Advisory Commission will then meet on May 5 to refine its final recommendations that will be presented to the City Council on June 7.



Chief's Corner: A Tribute to Don Cooper



I am sad to report that the University Place community has lost a valued and dedicated volunteer. Don Cooper, who donated countless hours of his time to the U.P. Police Department for nearly 20 years, passed away on March 15.

Throughout his years as a volunteer, Don worked under five different police chiefs and meticulously managed the City's registered sex offenders' verification records as well as the school bus paddle violation program. As a trusted and dependable member of our public safety team, he was officially recognized by the City Council in October 2019 upon his "retirement" from his volunteer role.

But Don's generosity to University Place will continue on. His wife of 57 years, Barbara, recently contacted us to let us know that she would like to fund the purchase of a new K-9 dog and vest for service through the Pierce County Sheriff's Department, of which UPPD is a contract agency. The \$10,000 gift comes at a perfect time, given that one of the PCSD's four K-9 dogs is getting old and may likely leave active duty within the next year.

"This is exactly what Don would have wanted," Barbara said. "When I thought about his life and where his happiest volunteer place was, it was with the U.P. Police Department. He loved it."

Barbara and her family have chosen a name for the new dog: *Rainier*. Don worked on the mountain during school breaks and would go on to summit its peak three times. "He had a love affair with that mountain. In fact, I often called it the third person in our marriage," Barbara joked.

"Every once in a while we are fortunate to have someone cross our paths who leaves such a lasting impression that even when they are gone, their spirit stays with us," said Jennifer Hales, public safety administrator for the City of University Place. "There is no doubt that Don was that kind of person."

USGA Returns to Chambers Bay with Four-Ball

Tournament



The United States Golf Association has announced that it will host the 6th U.S. Amateur Four-Ball Championship at Chambers Bay from May 22-26, 2021. Four-ball is better known to some as "best ball" play.

At the U.S. Amateur Four-Ball Championship, teams of two players play their own balls and the lower score of the

side is counted for the hole. Each side will play 36 holes of stroke play to reduce the field from 128 teams (sides) to the lowest 32 for match play. Like other USGA championships, the match play draw will be seeded according to stroke-play scores. Match play will then be contested over the final three days of the competition to determine the national champion pair.





The City of University Place has earned **WellCity** status from the Association of Washington Cities (AWC). By successfully meeting WellCity requirements established by the AWC Employee Benefit Trust, the City will save two percent on all AWC Trust active medical premiums in 2022.

City Council to Receive 5G and Small Cell System Recommendations

At its May 3 meeting, the University Place City Council will review the Planning Commission's recommendations regarding the introduction of 5G wireless technology across the city via Small Cell Distributed Network Systems.

Unlike macro systems that rely on tall towers, facilities on existing buildings and other structures such as water towers on private property, micro-systems (small cell) rely on small antenna located on



existing utility poles along public streets. Although macro antenna located on a few tall towers can have a range of several miles, micro antenna only range between 4,000 and 6,000 feet. Yet this tighter network can handle more signals at faster speeds. As few as 12 micro antennas can provide coverage for the entire city.

In drafting its recommendations, the Planning Commission reviewed Federal Communications Commission (FCC) regulations regarding the **siting of Small Cell Distributed Network Systems**, including statutory requirements related to State and local government review of infrastructure siting applications. The Planning Commission's recommendations include these factors as well as proposed regulations regarding application and permit processing, modification of existing facilities and design standards for different types of antenna, antenna locations and ancillary equipment to protect the environment and U.P.'s community aesthetics.

Curbside Oversize Brush Pickup



The Oversized Brush Pickup is available to all residential customers of **University Place Refuse and Recycling**, even those without yard waste service.

When: May 3-14

The pickup day for your area will be the same as your curbside recycling or yard waste pickup day during the week of May 3-14.

Pile Limitations: 1 per household, no larger than 6' wide by 6' long by 6' high.

Remember, this is a one day event for each neighborhood. The Oversized Brush Pickup is only for the larger brush and limbs that do not easily fit into a regular yard waste cart. Limbs are removed by machine or pitchfork. Sweeping of small items by the customer can be expected.

Oversized brush includes: branches, brush, and limbs no larger than 6' in length or 4" in diameter. Please stack loose for pickup (no cans, bags, or bundles).

Oversized brush does NOT include: blackberry, holly, or other thorny vegetation; stumps, limbs larger than 6' or thicker than 4"; small loose items such as grass, leaves, weeds, bark, pine/fir needles, etc. No noxious weeds like scotchbroom or English ivy, etc.

If you are signed up for yard waste service, please make maximum use of your cart before placing brush in a pile. Place your oversized brush in a loose pile at the curb or within 5 feet of the drivable portion of the roadway for pickup. Make sure the pile isn't in the street or blocking access to mailboxes or fire hydrants.
