School's in Session: Slow Down

The 2023-24 school year is now

underway and the University Place Police Department wants to remind all motorists to leave a little extra time in their morning and afternoon routines to slow down and be safe.

Walkers and bikers be sure to stop, look, listen and look again before crossing the street. Don't walk between parked cars where motorists cannot see you well. Use crosswalks and/or streets where crossing guards are on duty and always obey all traffic signals.



Bus riders should always cross 10 feet in front of the bus where the driver can see you. Stay out of the street and don't horse play at the bus stop. Stand back until the bus comes to a complete stop.

Drivers need to slow down and be ready for surprises. Pay attention to reduced speed limits in school zones. Obey state law that requires motorists to stop for buses with flashing red lights and extended STOP arms that indicate children are loading or unloading. Passing a stopped school bus can result in a fine up to \$500.

Whether you are walking, biking, riding or driving, back-to-school safety is everyone's business.

Residents SOUTH of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 14 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for FREE!



Clean Up Rules:

Limit: 1 load per household for all items EXCEPT for yard waste only loads.

Help us be good neighbors by securing & covering all loads.

- For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles.
- Photo I.D. WILL BE REQUIRED.
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK).
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed.
- No regular household garbage will be allowed.
- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed.
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture).
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK.

Please separate items into the following categories for recycling:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter.
- No DIRT, ROCKS, SOD, BLACKBERRIES, SCOTCHBROOM or OTHER NOXIOUS WEEDS.
- Tires: with or without rims.
- Concrete, brick and stone.
- Car batteries.

Unfortunately, he was a racist slave owner, vocal anti-abolitionist and regularly killed 100 birds a

day to pose them for his art.

We feel this name does not represent our people or our dedicated work in bird conservation, nor does it invite our community to join us in protecting local wildlife and habitats. Take Control in 1, 2, 3

September is National Preparedness Month and this year is focused on the importance of preparing older adults for disasters. The theme for the month is 1, 2, 3 – with three specific topics to guide your preparations.



- Assess your needs. If you have medications that need refrigeration, rely on mobility or assistive devices or have a pet, assess how these variables will factor into what you'll need to stay safe in a disaster or emergency.
- Make a plan. Once you assess your needs, tailor your plan to make sure your needs are met. This can include building a kit that includes extra medication, having a way to store medications in an emergency and planning for your pets or service animals.
- **Engage your support network.** Reach out to family, friends and neighbors who can help you build a support network for before, during and after a disaster or emergency. Share each aspect of your emergency plan with everyone in your group.

September is "Puget Sound Starts Here" Month

Did you know that poorly maintained tires may contribute to the declining salmon population?

Research shows a chemical (known as 6PPD-quinone) that prevents automotive tires from degrading and helps them last longer is the reason large numbers of



salmon are dying in Northwest creeks before they have a chance to spawn.

Research and development of non-toxic options to 6PPD-quinone is ongoing, but until a solution is found, one of the best things you can do right now to prevent this chemical from polluting our waterways is to regularly rotate and inflate your tires. Proper tire maintenance prevents tiny bits of rubber and plastic from worn tires—elements that are toxic to fish and other water life—from being washed into stormwater basins.

South Sound 911 launches first 911 Community Academy

Pierce County residents can learn about the inner workings of their

local 911 center through participation in the **South Sound 911 Community Academy.** The no-cost academy is scheduled from Oct. 3 to Nov. 7 and will host sessions on Tuesdays, 6:30–8 p.m., at **South Sound 911**.



The South Sound 911 Community Academy offers a comprehensive look at 911 and dispatch operations and other functions within the agency. Participants will walk away with a better understanding of emergency services and gain insight into the various roles, from 911 telecommunicators to law enforcement and fire dispatchers.

"We are excited to introduce the South Sound 911 Community Academy," said Executive Director Deborah Grady. "This is a great opportunity for our residents to connect directly with those in action and understand the fundamentals of emergency public safety communications."

The 911 Academy is limited to 20 participants; interested residents should register online at **SouthSound911CommunityAcademy.eventbrite.com** by Sept. 27. Space is limited to 20. To be eligible, participants must be at least 18 years old and pass a background check.
