Residents NORTH of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 7 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Residents SOUTH of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 14 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for FREE!



Clean Up Rules:

Limit: 1 load per household for all items EXCEPT for yard waste only loads.

Help us be good neighbors by securing & covering all loads.

- For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles.
- Photo I.D. WILL BE REQUIRED.
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK).
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed.
- No regular household garbage will be allowed.
- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed.
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture).
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK.

Please separate items into the following categories for recycling:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter.
- No DIRT, ROCKS, SOD, BLACKBERRIES, SCOTCHBROOM or OTHER NOXIOUS WEEDS.
- Tires: with or without rims.
- Concrete, brick and stone.
- Car batteries.

It's in the Bag

The baggers at Trader Joe's on Sept. 20 may have been a little overdressed—and some might say a little underqualified—but that's because they were a bit out of their element.

U.P. Police Chief Pat Burke and Sgt. Zach Bregel spent an hour bagging groceries (not criminals) at the Bridgeport Way store as part of Trader Joe's "Guest Baggers" program. The pair used the time to introduce themselves to



customers and employees and answered questions and concerns patrons had about public safety in U.P.

"We much prefer to meet the people we serve in a setting like this, as opposed to during an emergency situation," Burke said. "I think it helps the community see that we truly are part of the community." Burke said he thought he aced the assignment, but "I will say I thought Sgt. Bregel's bagging skills were a bit shaky."

For the record, Bregel counters that he finished his shift with no broken eggs but did enjoy some good laughs with the customers. "Chief Burke's just jealous because I carefully separated the cold items and remembered to put the loaves of bread on the top of the bag."



Are You Ready to ShakeOut?

Millions of people live and work in earthquake-prone regions of the United States. A major earthquake could cause unprecedented devastation for one of these regions but also affect the economy of the







entire country. What we do now, before a big earthquake, will determine how well we survive and recover.

Each year, Great ShakeOut Earthquake Drills involve millions of participants worldwide through broad-based outreach programs, media partnerships, and public advocacy by hundreds of partners. The drill is held annually on the third Thursday of October. This year, International ShakeOut Day will be on October 19. However, people and organizations can hold their drills on any other day of the year.

A key aspect of the ShakeOut is the integration of comprehensive science-based earthquake research and the lessons learned from decades of social science research about why people get prepared. The result is a "teachable moment" on par with having an actual earthquake (often followed by increased interest in getting ready for earthquakes). ShakeOut creates the sense of urgency that is needed for people, organizations, and communities to get prepared, to practice what to do to be safe, and to learn what plans need to be improved.

Not just any drill will accomplish this; it needs to be big. It must inspire communities to come together. It must involve children at school and parents at work, prompting conversations at home. It must allow every organization, city, etc., to make it their own event. We are all in this together.

To participate, go to **ShakeOut.org/register** and pledge your family, school, business, or organization's participation in the drill. Registered participants will receive information on how to plan their drill and involve others. At the minimum practice one of the recommended protective actions listed at **ShakeOut.org/dropcoverholdon**. It is only a one-minute commitment for something that can save your life.

Candidates vying for three open U.P. City Council positions in this year's election were asked to provide their responses to three questions as part of the City's Voters' Guide. Boykin and Wahid are running to fill Council Position 2, which is currently held by Council Member Kent Keel, who is not seeking reelection. Cunningham and Grassi are running for Council Position 7, currently held by Council Member Caroline Belleci, who is also not seeking reelection. Council Member Flemming is running unopposed to continue serving Council Member Position 6.

In addition to U.P.'s Video Voters' Guide, the Tacoma-Pierce County League of Women Voters will hold a **Candidates Forum on Oct. 18 over Zoom**. Join online to hear what these candidates vying for U.P. City Council have to say on a variety of other issues.

Curbside Oversize Brush Pickup

November 6 - 17, 2023

Pile Limitations: 1 per household no larger than 6' wide by 6' long by 6' high

The Oversized Brush Pickup is available to all residential customers of University Place Refuse and Recycling, even those without yard waste service. The pickup day for your area will be the same as your curbside recycling or yard waste pickup day during the weeks shown above. Remember, this is a one day event for each neighborhood. The Oversized Brush Pickup is only for the larger brush and limbs that do not easily fit into a regular yard waste cart. Limbs are



easily fit into a regular yard waste cart. Limbs are removed by machine or pitchfork. Sweeping of small items by the customer can be expected.

Yes, Oversized Brush Includes: branches, brush, and limbs no larger than 6' in length or 4" in diameter. Please stack loose for pickup (no cans, bags, or bundles).

No, Oversized Brush Does Not Include: blackberry, holly, or other thorny vegetation; stumps, limbs larger than 6' or thicker than 4"; small loose items such as grass, leaves, weeds, bark, pine/fir needles, etc. No noxious weeds like scotchbroom or English ivy, etc.

If you are signed up for yard waste service, please make maximum use of your cart before placing brush in a pile. Place your oversized brush in a loose pile at the curb or within 5 feet of the driveable portion of the roadway for pickup. Make sure the pile isn't in the street or blocking access to mailboxes or fire hydrants.


What's UP with Biz?
