At its first City Council meeting of the new year, Frank Boykin and Melanie Grassi were sworn in as the newest members of the University Place City Council. Here's just a bit more information about them and their goals for their terms in office:

Frank Boykin has served as the vice chair of the City's Planning Commission for 12 years, as treasurer of the Economic Development Corporation of Pierce



County and was appointed by former governor Gary Locke to the Washington State Commission on African American Affairs. He currently works as the Program Director for the Washington Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA) Business Center (under the U.S. Department of Commerce). He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration from Lincoln University in Jefferson City, MO.

And the Winner is...





The competition was heated but after a two-week battle between the U.P. Police Department and West Pierce Fire & Rescue, UPPD prevailed and took home the winning title in the University Place Battle of the Badges blood drive.

Donors were asked to cast a vote for either U.P. Police or West Pierce Fire & Rescue as part of their donation process. UPPD secured 24 votes, narrowly surpassing the 22 votes for West Pierce Fire & Rescue. In all, the Red Cross secured 47 units of blood from 46 donors (39 percent of whom were first time donors). These donations will impact more than 140 people in need of lifesaving blood transfusions.

Larry Bleich, Community Volunteer Leader for the American Red Cross - South Puget Sound and Olympics, praised all the participants. "Congratulations to all and thank you for your time commitment and enthusiasm in supporting our drive," he said. He also extended a special thank you to Shanti Benoit-Boyce from NW Medical Arts who helped support the drive with her gift basket raffle and social media outreach.



Bleich said that although the UPPD may have won the battle, the real winner was the general population who will benefit from the much-needed blood donations.

City Posts Opening for Community Outreach Officer

The City of University Place has posted a job opening for a Community Outreach Officer (COO), a position that is funded through the public safety levy that was passed in 2023.

The COO will work with businesses, residents and other City departments to develop community relationships and advise on crime prevention



strategies to reduce crime and enhance the quality of life in U.P. The COO will have a limited commission from the City to enforce the municipal code and address violations primarily around parking, abandoned vehicles, noise and park rules, including homeless encampment/enforcement issues and coordinating human services and law enforcement support.

Work Continues on 35th Street Improvements



Crews are continuing to construct new retaining walls, new sidewalks, bike lanes, street lighting and landscaping along both sides of 35th Street between 67th Avenue and Bridgeport Way. Retaining wall construction on the south side is near completion and construction on the north side wall began this week. Utility coordination is underway and the contractor is completing vegetation clearing to make room for the new sidewalks. The improvements also call for the installation of a crosswalk with pedestrian-actuated flashing beacons on 35th Street at Morrison Road. The entire project is slated to be completed this summer.

The 35th Street improvements are funded through a \$2 million grant from the Federal Highway Administration. If you have questions about the project, please contact the Engineering Department at 253.460.2526.
