Help Shape the Future of the 27th Street Business District

The City's Planning and Development Services department is seeking public input on a plan for the 27th Street Business District, which runs along 27th Street West from Elwood Drive West to Morrison Road West. The goal is to develop a cohesive vision for the future of the



business area, along with goals, policies, actions and projects needed to implement the plan.

Community members are encouraged to **take a brief survey** to share their thoughts about how they currently use/visit the district as well as their vision for the future of the area. This is an opportunity for stakeholders to share the kinds of changes or improvements they want to see as well as specifics about what they believe the district needs (e.g., restaurants, parks, etc.).

Take the survey and encourage others to participate as well before it closes in mid-April. Then look for updates based on its findings to be shared with the public in the form of a sub-area plan, which will be presented to the Planning Commission and then City Council for approval.

Work to Begin on Cirque Park Inclusive Playground

After several years of planning and fundraising, the City of University Place, in conjunction with the University Place Parks & Recreation Foundation (UPPRF), will break ground on a new inclusive playground at Cirque Park on Friday, April 12 at 11 a.m.

In 2020, the City of U.P. applied for and received a grant from the state's Recreation and Conservation Office for playground improvements at Cirque Park. At the suggestion of the UPPRF, the plans for the playground



were amended to include many accessibility accommodations designed to remove physical and social barriers so children can play and interact together, regardless of their needs or abilities.

In conjunction with the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation, the UPPRF has been conducting a fundraising campaign to support the project. To learn more and contribute, visit the **UPPRF website**.

Initial site work for the playground will begin this spring, with construction slated to last throughout the summer.

from 6-8 p.m. in the City Hall Council Chambers regarding the Cirque Park Expansion Site Study.

Last year, the Park Advisory Commission launched a "Reimagining Cirque Park" initiative that included a community survey to assess the kinds of improvements park users might want to see in the 22-acre community park in the heart of the city.

One theme that gathered support was the idea of developing a Community Center in the park. This public meeting will give residents an opportunity to learn more about the status of this project and proposed options.

Please make plans to attend the meeting and continue to weigh in with what you want to see in Cirque Park's future.




Sanitary Sewer Service Expansion Project Moving Forward with Recommendations

At the Feb. 20 Council Meeting, the City Council approved the recommendation to move forward with plans to expand sanitary sewer service in up to four neighborhoods: Areas 2, 8, 12 and 5a (see map below). These areas were selected through evaluation of factors such as cost/parcels served, environmental impacts, history of septic failures, income levels, and public support. It is anticipated that the City will go out to bid for the construction in these areas later this year. Each area will be bid as an optional alternative and final award of work will be based on the available funding. The goal is to provide sewer service for as many as possible with the money available.

The scope of this project is to construct dry sewer mains into the areas chosen. Hooking up to the sewer main will not be required unless the property experiences a failure of their septic system, or the property redevelops.
