U.P. Hosts Critical Incident Stress Management Training

For three days in April, commissioned and non-commissioned members of law enforcement agencies from around the state attended special group and individual Critical Incident Stress Management training that was held in the U.P. City Council Chambers.

Nearly 40 first responders participated in a series of lectures, workshops and discussions designed to help them learn how to take care of each other after experiencing trauma in the field. The University Place Police



Department partnered with the Pierce County Sheriff's Department and Behind the Badge Foundation to provide the training at no cost to the participants. Behind the Badge Foundation helps law enforcement families and agencies cope with trauma, grief and loss after a line of duty death or serious injury.

University Place Police Chief Pat Burke was happy to have U.P. host the event, especially since UPPD's own Deputy Jason Smith has already completed the training. "The training is critical for our profession," Burke said. "I am grateful for the Behind the Badge Foundation. It was our privilege to host the training, and we were thrilled to have UPPD represented in the class."

In addition to this training, Behind the Badge Foundation also provides law enforcement officers and their families affected by trauma with legal counsel, injured officer support, financial planning and chaplaincy.

Combat Graffiti with SeeClickFix

Graffiti is a public nuisance that detracts from our community's quality of life and can embolden additional nuisance behaviors if not addressed quickly.

But there is a quick fix...SeeClickFix, to be specific. This easy-to-use free app enables residents to quickly report graffiti and other public nuisances, including abandoned cars on private property, excessive trash or other issues as defined in the **City's Municipal Code 9.35**. Search for the SeeClickFix app in the store on your smartphone, then download and install it.

Simply take a picture on your phone or tablet of the issue and submit it to the City via the app. Code Enforcement Officer Melanie Boehm will log the complaint and notify the property



owner. The City's Municipal Code calls for penalties for allowing "graffiti nuisance property" to exist for 15 business days after the date the City serves a notice of violation.

Those who wish to do so can also report issues via the **Code Enforcement** page on the City's website.

Property owners can also take simple steps to help deter taggers, such as improving lighting and making graffiti-prone areas more visible by removing overgrown vegetation. Graffiti-resistant products can be used to coat surfaces that are prone to vandalism such as fences and mailboxes.

All Pierce County residents, including those in University Place, can now throw food waste items into their yard waste carts.

Both U.P. Refuse and Recycling and LeMay Pierce County Refuse are participating in the program, which reminds residents that "If you can eat it, we can compost it." That means food waste such as fruit and vegetable cores and peels, coffee grounds, eggs shells, bread and rice can be put in yard waste containers.

This new program strives to reduce the tons of organic waste in the landfill and reduce harmful methane greenhouse gas emissions. All county residents should receive a mailer with more details. Beginner Birding with Ed Beck

If you're a casual birder who wants to build their birding practice, or a new a birder who doesn't know where to start, check out this new beginner birding class!

It covers the basics plus a little extrafrom how to use field guides and binoculars to how to bird ethically, use apps like merlin and e-bird and shares strategies for field identification.



No equipment or textbooks are required - we can also provide binoculars to those who don't have them! This class is suitable for birders 16 and up, but all minors must be accompanied by an adult.

Led by Tahoma Bird Alliance volunteer Ed Beck. Ed has been a birder most of his life, but has gotten more serious in the past five years.

About the Instructor:

"About five years ago we had a hard winter that drove foothills birds down to our elevation. This is when the variety of birds, how they adapt to their environment, and their behavior made me want to learn more. Since then, I've been a more active birder, going on bird walks, taking classes, and learning as much as I could. I'm teaching this course because I want to share my love of birding with others."
