#### **Adriana Hess Work Party on Nov. 16**

Volunteer with the Pierce Conservation District by spending three hours at Adriana Hess Wetland Park in University Place on Saturday, Nov. 16 from 9 a.m. to noon.

Activities will include caring for existing plants in the demonstration gardens around the Tahoma Bird Alliance building and removing invasive species such as Himalayan blackberry, nonnative trees, and English ivy. This work



supports water quality, our local wildlife, and pollinators. Exact meeting location will be provided after signing up.

#### What will volunteers be doing at the event?

While the exact tasks at hand vary through the year, our projects focus on improving the open spaces, forests, and parks in our local cities. Healthy ecosystems and thriving wetlands are vital to our community because they absorb and naturally filter rainwater, produce clean oxygen, provide living spaces for wildlife, and create a place for people to connect with the outdoors.

In order to create healthy forests and riparian zones, the work can include:

Caring for existing plantings

- Adding a layer of tree mulch in the restoration spaces to reduce regrowth of invasive weeds
- Removing invasive species such as:
  - English ivy
  - Himalayan blackberry

For your safety and comfort please bring:

- Clothing that can get dirty
- Long pants and sleeves
- Sturdy shoes (closed toed shoes required, no sandals or flats)
- Rain gear and warm layers (the event will happen rain or shine)
- Full water bottle



## Work on Phase 2 of 35th Street West Improvements Begins

Work is scheduled to begin this week on Phase 2 of improvements along 35th Street West from Bridgeport Way to Grandview Drive. The contractor will begin clearing brush and trees along the length of the site. When complete, the project will feature planter strips with street trees, new sixfoot sidewalks, and five-foot bike lanes on each side of the street. There will also be new street lighting.



The entire project is slated to be completed by early June 2025.




## City Signs New Interlocal Agreement with Pierce County Sheriff's Department

The City of University Place recently approved a new seven-year Public Safety Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with the Pierce County Sheriff's Department (PCSD) that will provide an expanded scope of work and services in support of the U.P. Police Department.

The PCSD has provided law enforcement services to U.P. since 1997 under the terms of the first ILA between the City and County. This newly executed

agreement maintains the basic terms of the first agreement for services (as well as ensuing amended versions), but also includes provisions for additional deputies and enhanced public safety equipment that have been made possible thanks to dedicated funding from the approved 2023 public safety levy.

Four additional officers were added to the UPPD force on Nov. 11, including a second sergeant and three patrol officers. Under the terms of the new ILA, Pierce County will assign four additional levyapproved staff next year, to include three patrol officers and a much-needed dedicated traffic officer. The second staff is a second second



"We are grateful that this new agreement ensures that we can provide the services our citizens voted for in April 2023," said U.P. City Manager Steve Sugg.
